

Overview of Community Resources - Maine

This introduction to community resources in Maine can help you begin to understand options and explore if you may be eligible.

Maine Community Action Partnership

Community Action Agencies can help to locate resources in your area. Programs can include food assistance, housing programs, and access to other community resources.

Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRC)

- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) maine.gov/dhhs/ofi/programs-services/tanf
 Provides cash assistance to eligible families with dependent children and to pregnant individuals.
- General Assistance (GA) maine.gov/dhhs/ofi/programs-services/general-assistance Assists individuals and families with meeting their basic needs by helping to pay for household supplies, food, housing, etc.
 - Apply at your local Municipal Office or call 1-800-442-6003.
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) maine.gov/dhhs/ofi/programs-services/food-supplement
 Previously known as Food Stamps, SNAP funds may be used to buy food. Individuals and families with low income may qualify.

Additional Cash Assistance

- The Social Security Administration (SSA) has two programs for people with serious disabilities. Find your local SSA office: secure.ssa.gov/lcon/main.jsp or call 800-772-1213. We recommend you apply in person or on the phone if possible.
 - **Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI)** for those who have recently worked and paid Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes for a certain period of time before becoming disabled.

• **Supplemental Security Income (SSI)-** for those who are disabled, blind, or age 65+. This is a needs-based program with income and asset limits.

Food Assistance

- SNAP See DHHS above for information about SNAP (formerly food stamps). The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC): People with low-income may qualify if they are pregnant, breastfeeding, nonbreastfeeding postpartum, or a child up to their 5th birthday.
