

# **Subsidized Housing in Massachusetts: The Basics**

## **Housing Consumer Education Centers (HCECs)**

#### **Priorities and Preferences**

There are long waitlists for all types of subsidized and affordable housing in the area. If you qualify, a priority and/or a preference (sometimes called "emergency housing") may move you up a waitlist more quickly, or add your name to an otherwise closed waitlist; they do NOT get you immediate housing. Ask about priorities/preferences at each place you apply.

## Tips

- Unfortunately, there is no single place to apply for all subsidized housing options, but don't be discouraged. Stick with it. The more waitlists you get your name on, the greater your chances of finding affordable housing in a timely manner.
- Keep track of where you apply and let them know if you move or your situation changes. It is important to update your address to avoid missing an offer or being removed from a waitlist. If you may now be eligible for a preference, it isn't too late to apply- ask them how.
- **Prepare for an offer.** Contact an advocate if you have a criminal record, credit problems, or have had problems with a previous landlord.
