Problem Statement

Throughout the United States, Black and Hispanic patients are less likely to receive dermatologic subspecialty care than white patients.¹

At Brigham and Women's Hospital's main outpatient dermatology clinic, 221 Longwood Ave, the patient population does not reflect the diversity of the city of Boston.

One entrance into dermatology follows primary care referral. Black and Hispanic patients are 11 and 19% less likely than white patients to be referred by BWH primary care physicians to dermatology for care. And when they are referred, 7-8% less likely to complete their appointment.


Care from a dermatology specialist frequently changes diagnosis, management, and improves outcomes,² and the dermatologic needs of our community are not being served by current processes of referral at MGB.



Process Map:


Patient Scheduling after PCP Referral







- · Headband wigs [e]








